h, the serenity of "The Lake" – its breathtaking sunrises, the symphony of nature, children gleefully capturing elusive turtles, the thrill of a fish tugging at a fishing pole, and the timeless memories of early morning skiing or a sunset cruise. However, this paradise is under threat from pollutants, toxins, and invasive plant species, potentially rendering the water undrinkable, unworthy of swimming, and the fish unsafe to eat. Consider the ramifications: diminished property values, a shrinking tax base, loss of jobs, and a domino effect of economic setbacks. Did you know that Steuben County boasts the largest concentration of recreational homes in Indiana, accounting for 10% (4,300 homes) while representing only 1% of the state's population.





We had State Representative Dave Abbott, District 82 (Noble County), as our speaker for this year. Representative Abbott came to speak about Water Quality and Wake boat Legislation that he has been and will be working on in this year too. There was a discussion on what we can do to bring awareness of what wake surfing on portions of a lake is causing. It is causing Irreparable damage to the shoreline, lake bottom, aquatic vegetation, fisheries and the nutrient loading to the waters. There are studies already taking place in several states in Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin to name a few. They have already started regulations on these boats. Steuben County Lakes Council would like to facilitate a few zoom calls with Representative Abbott to give feedback on the Wake board bill. We will be talking about what the lake associations and lake residents as individuals can do to help get this bill passed. As Representative Abbott did discuss that it would be great to have lake landowners come and speak for this bill when it is in the committee and to the full house of representatives in Indianapolis. plants. We also applied for a LARE Dredging Grant for the Tanglewood/Paradise View area, which is the channel at the west end of the lake. Although denied, we were encouraged to apply again in the future when additional funding may be available. Some residents have applied privately for dredging permits and were approved. Unfortunately, the need for dredging is partially due to there being quite a few sand beaches added along the said channel. A Reminder: A DNR permit is required to dump anything into the lake or shoreline, e.g. sand or gravel. For the August Annual Membership meeting our guest speaker was Deputy Sheriff Mike Meeks, of the Steuben County Sherriff's Department and head of their Marine Patrol. He discussed how the Sheriff's Department helps the DNR to patrol our lakes. They receive a \$15,000 LARE grant that helps to subsidize the marine patrol. Still, they have a very limited budget to support everything from patrolling to required equipment, to include boats. Even with this engaging guest speaker, the attendance was no better than our monthly board meetings. Which, to be honest, the attendance of the monthly meetings has increased from last year. It may be due to the "Call to Action" article in our last JLA annual newsletter. We appreciate the call was not ignored.

LAKE GAGE

It has been another busy and fantastic year for Lake Gage and Lime Lake! The LG-LL Association held 4 general meetings for our members and residents from both lakes (May through August) and had a speaker at each meeting. We started off in May with Lee Greenamyer, the Director of the Steuben County Emergency Management Agency. Lee provided excellent information regarding the vast coordination with all the emergency departments and how we all play a part during emergencies. In June we had a presentation from Ron Menze the District/Region Manager for the American Red Cross. Ron is based out of Fort Wayne but owns a home on Lake Gage as well. Ron provided great information on how the American Red Cross is much more than just blood donations. In July, Jelsie Kerr made a presentation regarding the endangered Cisco fish that lives in Lake Gage. Jelsie did an initial presentation on the Cisco in August of 2023, and she headed up a large lengthy on-site study of the Cisco fish population in Lake Gage during 2023. Her presentation at the July 2024 meeting provided a summary of her study. The Cisco is doing OK in Lake Gage, but temperature inversions in the water have the potential to restrict the habitat zone for the Cisco. And in August, the Association welcomed back Nathan Cooper an Indiana Conservation Officer for District 2/Steuben County. Nathan also spoke to the Association in May of 2023. Once again, Nathan provided a wealth of information regarding updates on water safety and enforcement actions that are provided to the lakes of Steuben County. All the speakers provided great information to our lake residents. The LG-LL Association published its newsletter, the SHORE LINES, each month (May through August). Each issue was filled with current events and up to date information regarding activities at the lakes. The Association is very fortunate to have Annie Streit as our editor of the Shore Lines. Each issue was very well received. Activities at Lake Gage and Lime Lake for this past Spring/Summer seasons included our annual Garage Sale in

Later in the Spring, we put out buoys to warn boaters about shallow areas, no wake zones, and other hazards. Our 2024 Annual Meeting was on Saturday, June 8 at the Steuben County Event Center. Agenda items included a review our weed control program for the year, an update on the condition of the Dam at the outfall of the third basin, efforts to reduce sediment draining into the lake, and more. As usual, the fourth of July weekend was our busiest time of the year including the Boat Parade and Fireworks on the 6th, Light the Lake Red on the 5th, and the Freedom 5 Run and Walk on the 4th. The Freedom 5 was especially successful this year with 646 participants, another record level of participation! Summer activities will conclude with our Poker Run on September 1. We also continued cooperating with the Steuben County Lakes Council to maintain water testing to monitor for pollutants with potential for human disease and nonnative weed growth. Thanks to all Council members and their leadership for this important work. In closing, our Association sends sincere thanks to our many volunteers who gave so generously of their time and talents in 2024 to sponsor fun activities, as well as efforts to keep our lake clean and safe! The 101 Lakes Trust's Reflections on a Lake returned to Hamilton Lake Aug. 18 after a six-year hiatus in celebration of Hamilton Lake Association's 50th anniversary. BIG & LITTLE OTTER LAKE


